


Would you like more information?




2. The association has 70% of our membership on direct E Mail Do you want information to be E Mailed directly to you?




3. Are you aware the association has a web site?




Do you find the web site useful?








5. Do you compete in WDVGA one day tournaments?




If you answered "yes" to question 5 by which criteria do you select events?




Do you prefer start time of?






6. The recommended entry fee for WDVGA one day tournaments is \$10.00

Would you play if it was increased to \$15.00?




7. Do you feel you get receive fair value for money in association one day events have attended




Are the number and value of prizes awarded acceptable at most events?







- This is a comment on a general disincentive to playing in Vets events including Hamilton. Clubs need to be more consistent in using the T designation for tournaments. When I was twice put on an R in my late 60s I found alternatives to golf like fishing more rewarding than travelling to golf and starting 3-4 shots disadvantage to fellow competitors. My general dissatisfaction with golf was increased when I saw some

players getting away with good scores in tournaments that were not being entered as T.I still find it hard to pass up a good fishing day for golf. I was not trying to cheat just getting older and not able to hit so far.


- Perhaps arrange a cheaper cart hire rate for those hiring a cart for the full 3 days.






Would you be more likely to play the event over (36 holes)?




Would you be more likely to play the event on a different course?




Would you be more likely to play the event at another time of the year?




Should the championships be played at other Waikato courses?






9. Do you consider Veteran Golfers are spoilt for choice when deciding which events to play

Number of responses: 477




When deciding what and where to play please indicate by marking the rating stars, please rate 1-5 (1 star being least likely) - simply click the appropriate star




Is a Club event the highest priority?

Number of responses: 476




Is a New Zealand event the highest priority?

Text answers:

- I think you are doing a pretty good job I have been playing the nz circuit for over twenty six years but as I am getting a bit older I find driving long distances is getting abit harder so I am looking more at events closer to home but there are many events around the country which I enjoy more then others and I know many other golfers feel the same because of the number that attend so we catch up with friends we have made over the years from all over nz
- Have not played any of the WDVGA tournament to date but it sounds exciting to take part in will look foward to the next one
- When I retire I will become a more active member. About 5 yrs away
- Not spending all the prize money on the top few, but spredding the prizes to at least half the field, which would encourage more players to attend
- Just depends on whether I am able to play on the day of the Tournaments
- I have not been playing vets golf long enough to give an opinion on this matter
- As I haven't played many events to date I can't comment but am keen, weather and day permitting, to participate in future events
- Have never played event

- I'm a new vet still feeling my way
- Long term member but Limited activity primarily through a combination of poor communication within club and frequent absence overseas
- For team's events (below) too much priority given to in-club cliques!
- You do a great job, well organised with great communication.
- I attend events with a large group of motor homers. Is this going to be a problem in the future? Our feeling is that this group is going to get larger as baby boomers retire and join in the fun. What is going to be planned in the future for this group as we are great supporters of these events and add to the local economy in many ways and plus drink at the bar and eat at the cafe.
- It is disappointing that quite a few of the vet days are held on a Thursday which is our men's club day. Having all vet days on. Set day like Monday would suit myself and a lot of Waitomo members. A lot of our members will not go to a vet day if it is held on a Thursday.
- There are too many and clash with our own Club day
- Prefer not to comment as I am really a visitor.
- There seems to be sufficient events, depends if golf is only retirement thing or shared with other interests
- Not dissatisfied so no comments.
- Maybe include women in all events as we both like to play golf
- Perhaps we have too many events.
- Fewer events might increase the demand and lead to more entrants.
- I think the golfing calendar should be worked out to avoid playing on courses that have just been cored. Playing golf and representing your club at a course that has just been cored is absolutely soul detroying.
- Improve slow play
- Can we standardize the day and avoid clashing with Vets cub days
- I would love to be part of it but I can't play on Sunday due to my Responsibilities as a Pastor being Vets most are Retired why not make the Competitions Thursday to Saturday or Wednesday to Friday I beli be it will draw in a New Breed of Golfers to represent their Clubs
- Can't say
- Limit clubs to only one "One Dayer" per year. Rising petrol costs will probably lead to reduction in the size of the fields. If entry frees are kept to \$10, and fewer prizes given, perhaps the numbers may not reduce as much. After all, prizes should be a reward for good golf on the day, and not for mediocre scores.
- The WVGA is a well-oiled organisation with a good team of conveners.
- At the moment I am very involved with my own Club on the Management side and don't get time to play golf as
 much as I would like I think they are pretty good as they are. One can only play so much golf as one gets older
- Don't let events clash.
- Am quite happy with the current. Not being in it before I'd rather not comment
- If the tournaments are held one or two days of the week ie say only on Mondays and Wednesdays, then those of us who are still working part time can organise our days off such that we can take part in more games and travel more.

- Re-Vamp of one day events, look at better liaison with clubs and NZ vets as to programming, club's to look at
 when they schedule events. Ie no good holding it on their Vets day if all their neighboring clubs have the same
 club day.
- Perhaps a standardization of a day to hold these events for all the majority of clubs, say a Monday or Friday?
- I don't know what the entry fee for the Waikato Championships are, but at \$40 per round for a cart (which i have to use) at St Andrews it becomes a very expensive event, This also applies to many other Vets events.
- Have on same day of the week or only 2 daya of the week so club events can be organised around that and any other commitments can be organised around these 2 days
- I have not played in these events long enough or seriously enough to comment constructively here
- Set a minimum payout for prizes, so that some clubs aren't seen as ripoffs. Encourage more mixed tournaments so that women feel comfortable about entering.
- At 81 do not attend any away fixtures now ,prefer to keep playing once a week that's enough.
- It is hard for me to say as I only usually play in a Xmas tournament and one other during the year
- Not sure at this time maybe to many day just not sure
- An additional vets handicapping system that monitors frequent winners and imposes more challenging
 handicaps. Some winners seem regularly able to play exceptionally better than their handicaps when prizes are
 on offer.
- not in a position to comment as i've been off the scene for a while and am only now returning to play
- I don't play them often enough to give my opinion
- Thank you for all your time and effort put in to giving local vets such a wonderful choice of clubs to visit and play on (for only \$10 a time, phenomenal!) I played in the Nth Harbour one recently and Auckland vets have nothing like the benefits we experience here. One of the organisers Owen Young, a fellow leftie, played tourney as a stable ford only comp. which must have been pretty hard for low handicap players to compete in 9-18 group. I think your current programme and methodology is excellent, thanks.
- I still work. Once this ceases I will be more inclined to play more events
- I have not played events as yet as I still work 5 days a week
- Encourage more clubs to take part
- The start time is important, but they are inconsistent. Those with early starts around 9am are not encouraging visitors who on average must travel about an hour to get there. Those clubs should ask themselves why they have it in the programme! A 10 am start is better for travellers. Just a comment on Q10. We already have vets pennants so there is no need for a team's event at one day tournaments. Team events are a commitment while one dayers are casual events to attend if they ate relatively close and preferably start at 10. (1.25 hrs)
- Sorry lots of No's but cannot play 18 holes much, certainly not two days running, medical problem nothing to do
 with the Vets

- One day events clashing with pennants programme is not ideal. Tighten the one day programmes by having some East and West programmes on the same week but not the same day. It would not affect each Club much as the majority of their numbers come from local area Clubs, but it would give the keen ones some more choice. It is difficult to programme when many NZ events for Vets are scheduled in our area, but I do realise a number of players like and support them
- I would like to play more Waikato one day events and other two day events but simply run out of time, have other commitments but I try to support the best I can, I appreciate the efforts clubs go to.

- The selection of courses is a bit suspect, eg the Morrinsville course was not up to scratch the fairways had not been mowed and the greens were not good.

- Consider having the finals of the waikato events at a more central course as the waikato area is vast. It is a
 disincentive when the venue requires an overnight stay because the event starts at 8am in most cases of 36
 hole events
- I'm not interested in these events.
- The current calendar has plenty to choose from for all players. I have made the effort to travel to clubs not that
 close to home, one to two hours driving, to play different courses and meet new people. I have enjoyed all of
 the events I have played in.
 - When scheduling the vets' dates, it is important that they don't clash with other events that can impact the attendance numbers. Matamata GC's vets' day in April had just 33 attends as it clashed with a two-day tournament at Te Aroha and it was also the final round of The Masters. Makes it difficult for the organisers to predict the number of prizes required especially when the butcher is preparing meat packs for the much larger number that is expected to turn up.

I would also like to see the ongoing results from each zone of pennants posted on the web site. I did look several times while the competition was in progress but couldn't find anything.

- if all club tournaments were played on the same day of the week ie Monday or Tuesday would make it easier
 for members to know when tournaments were being played. this would also avoid clashing with clubs who
 have regular club days later in the week
- I have not answered many sections of this survey as several aspects are "not applicable" for me. The responses available are "Yes or "No". There is no provision for "Not Applicable". The survey also assumes that a veteran responding to this survey has had some experience in Waikato events etc etc. I do not have these experiences. This is another reason I have not completed all sections.
- In addition, there is no provision to make comments outside of the survey, hence the reason I have added comment to this space.
- More one day events 18 holes. 36 holes is too hard for old fellas and 2-3 day events are too expensive with meals and accommodation added on.
- I like the programme as it is.
- All Clubs get choice of one date be it 1 or 2 day then look at extra events some clubs have 3 events often in the better weather periods
- Program to cluttered round pennants
- I enjoy the Waikato vets tournaments but please no increase in entry fees as I am sure you would lose entrants as most players are pensioners on limited income Cheers
- \$15 entry should include twos. If there is a big field, there should be two divisions to give the lower handicappers a fairer chance of a prize. Unless there is a large woman's field, they should be absorbed into the main field. What makes this game so enjoyable, is each club runs its day slightly differently which adds variety and, at time, great entertainment. Keep up the good work.
- I think the Waikato programme as is at present offers a good variety golf to most members and can see no real reason to make too many changes. Ngahinapouri members are especially adamant that the Waikato day entry fee remains at \$10.00. Clubs should not see these days as a means to make a profit. A good prize table can be achieved with a \$10.00 entry fee with raffles as an extra. Now that Waikato Golf have a more comprehensive email list, a reminder to members when an event is to take place could see an increase in participants.
- I think you do well considering the low cost of entry
- I am not entering Waikato events, because of my age and ability and costs
- Too many events. Try one per club per year.
- Do not play enough to comment
- As i am reliant on golf cart this survey is not really relevant to me
- I really just enjoy the company...having a relaxed round with similar aged people...
- Have not participated in many events as have only been active in vets golf for two years. Also play golf with chartered clubs. Do not believe I can make comment without greater participation
- Consideration should be made for older and higher h/cap players and allowing them to play off the shorter tees!
- Passed competitive golf
- A new member so not applicable
- As we get older competitions are not a priority, Just fellowship with a round of golf. Early starts on cold mornings in the winter are out.
- Prefer team events around various locations

- As a low handicap golfer, it is very difficult to compete with golfers on 24 to 36 handicaps when the competition is based on net scores or stableford. Each event needs to be organised so that the field is split into at least two divisions (eg. up to 18 and 19 and over). Alternatively, there should at least be some recognition of the best gross scores on the day.
- I would play more events if carts were available. My health means I need a cart.
- Play more around Hawkes Bay & Taupo
- Support our Waikato/NZ events and make sure that NZ Vets Assoc support our events and do not move competing events onto our dates. As they did in March this year.
- Unfortunately, I am one who does not like morning golf so a lot of the answers above are irrelevant however I
 do like to support my club in Intermatch competitions when able.
- It is adequate in it's present form.
- I think it is fine as it is
- I have only played in a few since joining Vets, but have been more than happy with the programmes presently on offer
- If Clubs are prepared to host events be it pennants or one day events every effort needs to be made to provide a Course that is a fair test of golf not a lucky dip of newly cored greens or unmown greens. There is an urgent need for clubs to collaborate with each other to allow them both their annual maintenance programme and a chance to provide a Course up to standard
- I am quite satisfied with how they are run now.
- Maybe find sponsors for more tournaments. Sell naming rights for prizes. Monday's are good days to play vets.
- I think the programme as such is fine. I feel the biggest improvement which could be brought about (somehow?) would be getting players in the 'bigger membership' clubs within our Ass. to even occasionally play in W.V.G.A. "one dayers" -even if it's on courses close to home-rather than just playing at their own club week after week. Everyone would get more fun out of W.Vets golf if this could be somehow achieved. But can we change old habits ????. The other aspect of the 'one dayers' which some clubs need to address is the fact that players not go back to a club where they have been given a raw deal in some way. If clubs (convenors) follow the recommended formula closely they will get return business. Ignore the formula or refuse to correct errors- nobody will come back. Visit other clubs, learn from their successful system (or errors) and go for it.
- In regard to 0 the 54 hole one as far as I am concerned it is the three days of travel that is the reason for my non attendance
 - If it was just 18 holes I would probably play but I certainly cannot afford to stay in a motel or pay for petrol for the three days.
 - Perhaps a suggestion of playing it in the summer over 36 holes completed in one day
- you guys are doing well
- No doubt you can fine tune your programme and organization but I am no longer participating. I used to be heavily
 involved in the organization. (Waikato President. Waikato Rep on NZ Vets, Vice President NZ Vets.) but age has
 caught up with me and I now need a cart. Unfortunately the cost of cart hireage at away clubs is prohibitive and I
 no longer travel.
- You do well as it is!
- Prices for two divisions, 0 to 18 and >18, fixed division, prices to 50% of players in each division on stable ford.
- I THINK YOU DO VERY WELL. I HAVENT PLAYED MUCH GOLF BECAUSE OF INJURY.

- Have only just started but I am aware of a lot of 70 yr olds who need prompting to get out and join and will make
 an effort to get them along.
- As our club is also in the covic group better communication on dates would help.
- Club variation to me is attractive. I like different courses rather than same as same as.
- Just keep on keeping on.
- I have moved to Whanganui recently. The programme in this area is far less than offered to the Waikato area and the costs somewhat higher. While there are not so many players or those interested in this area the costs of golf, including annual club membership fee, annual vets membership fee, cost of each event when it does happen may well be a financial disincentive for many to play golf. I have been a member for life of Waikato Vets with a fee at the time of \$20.00 Here it is \$10.00 annually.
 - Take care not to rock the boat and make it financially difficult for players to join as many clubs are struggling financially now and this flows through numbers attending events.
- I would like to play more events, but I work and this has precluded my involvement in 36-54 hole events. I will have more time from now on, so may get to more events.
- I prefer earlier starts in hot weather, but acknowledge the people have to have time to travel.
- Being in Whitianga just takes so long to get to other Waikato club's, only good if your going as a team
